# 3. Highlighting Indigenous-led initiatives and organizations: Willow River Centre (WRC)

On Oct 7th, 2023, Willow River Centre opened its doors. Located at 243 King St E, Kitchener, Willow River Centre is Indigiqueer-led, providing space for urban Indigenous Two Spirit, trans and non-binary youth and settler LGBTQ+ allies. They provide access to resources, Two Spirit teachings/ programming, and local advocacy for 2SLGBTQ+ issues and Indigenous sovereignty for the FNMI queer community. The centre is also used as a market, performance and gallery space for general public attendance. Rooted in O:se Kenhionhata:tie, the Land Back Camp initiative in our cities, they continue to work closely with grassroots organizations in Waterloo Region to call for Land Back and other land and social justice actions.
